Truth and Reconciliation

n September 30, John Knox students participated in Orange Shirt Day to honour the Indigenous children who were sent away to residential schools in Canada. Through art, language, song and drama, students learned more about the history of those schools and how they impacted the Indigenous community.

In October, John Knox students were invited to live out the message of Truth and Reconciliation by donating school and art supplies, and winter hats, gloves, mitts and socks to a community in Eabametoong (Fort Hope) First Nation, a fly-in community, one hour north of Thunder Bay.

The Encore Thrift Store also pitched in and donated luggage to transport all of our gifts to Fort Hope, and REGEN Brampton donated a large bag of new hats and mitts from their Thrift store!

All of the items, along with books and bibles from the school, were brought to Eabametoong by John Knox parents, Andres and Claudia

Quiroga as part of their ministry with 'The Gospel Changes' (CCA Maranatha Canada). This opportunity provided a tangible way to put our love into action and make a real connection with our brothers and sisters who live in this Indigenous community. he growing season is coming to a close and our first harvest is almost complete. Our tomato plants yielded a moderate amount of fruit and along with some kale and fresh basil, we were able to share our modest bounty with Regeneration to

use in the daily meals they prepare for those who are at risk of not having enough to eat. There's a second crop of leaf lettuce that will be ready to pick in the next week or so, and I spied a few late season strawberries as well. We've been so blessed that temperatures are holding so we can extend our growing season a tiny bit.

We also installed a rain gauge and are now part of the Community

The future plans for the garden are to add teaching areas where classes can gather and learn more about sustainability and how things grow, make weather observations, and dicover so many more natural surprises. We've also added two corner beds that will be the "experimental" gardens where students can really dig in and learn about soil or perhaps control the growing conditions to observe what happens to plants that receive more nutrients, or perhaps less water; the possibilities are endless!

The Grade 8 class will once again take on the role of designers and caretakers as we plan added features like semi-permanent benches, bird houses, finish the entrance area and prepare the garden for the winter months.

The garden is named "Hope Garden" for a reason. Our vision is to see our garden as a place where we cultivate not only flowers and food, but true stewardship and awareness of the blessings God gives us so we can also share those blessings with others.

Did You Know...

- There are 120 families enrolled this school year compared to last year's 108.
- While JKCS was originally founded in 1959 by families of Dutch, Christian Reformed (CRC) backgrounds, these families now comprise less than 25% of our school population. The remaining 75% of families come from many other denominations.
- Students receive 12,000 hours of instructional time from Kindergarten to Grade 8!

n early 2020, Grace was selected as one of 30 young people from around the world to be part of a youth panel for the United Nations Day of General Discussion on the Rights of the Child. and she began attending several virtual meetings in preparation for the BIG day. After several Covid delays and a shift from an in-person meeting in Geneva to a virtual meeting, in September of 2021, Grace addressed the UN (United Nations). As quoted from her address, 'Every child deserves to be listened to, respected, and taken seriously by adults.'

In 2019, Grace was selected as part of a panel of students to talk about Disabilities and Education at Ryerson University. She continues to advocate for children with special needs and on October 11, 2021, addressed WHO (World Health Organization) as they discussed developmental disabilities and mental health and how these issues are handled around the world.

Since 2014, Grace has also been a proud member of PCT Eternity, a Cheerleading organization who have been named as 'Team Canada—Special Abilities' every year since 2018.

Grace shared a few personal reflections about her time at JKCS.

JKCS has been so important in my learning and personal growth. Living with multiple disabilities is far from easy but JKCS taught me that even despite the struggles I may face, I can achieve great things. In Grade 6, Mrs. M. helped me to feel more included in track and field; instead of competing against my peers, I competed against myself. Although my personal athletic events might not bring my team to victory, and no records were broken, I proved to myself that I am capable of doing better. By persevering and putting in my best effort I accomplished something that I didn't think would have been possible—I completed the 1500 metre run! What a great lesson!

While this may not seem relevant, I think when you look at all the suffering going on in the world it's hard to see how we can ever overcome those issues. But just as I competed in track and field, we just have to take things one step at a time. If you work hard and believe in a better world, then you can achieve things that people never thought would be possible. My work requires a lot of faith and perseverance, sometimes I get discouraged but I feel this is what God wants me to do and how he is working through me, by changing the lives of individuals one step at a time.

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
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
