When September 2020 rolled around, we all had hopes that the pandemic protocols would be a temporary inconvenience and our school year would flow into something resembling normalcy. 'Hope' was our chosen theme for the 2020-21 year. How could we create a lasting symbol of hope to lift our spirits during a very trying time? A garden is a perfect beacon of hope. After the long winter, the hope of plants springing up and growing would surely brighten our days. This garden would bless both the students and the community, and each student would have the opportunity to be involved. Grade 8 would design the layout and research the care of the plants and younger students would plant seeds and nurture the seedlings in preparation for planting. Ultimately, the plants and the produce from the garden would bless the community by providing some fresh vegetables to local organizations like Regeneration and Knights Table who serve members of our community who are at risk.

The planning and learning commenced, and we all looked forward to spring when the construction of the garden could begin. And then COVID shut us down, literally. We returned to remote learning and connecting only with our own households. Our grade 8 students were totally discouraged; but God ALWAYS finds a way to change our perspective. As I sat listening to the litany of what we were and were not allowed to do, it occurred to me that being with our own households might work! Over the next three weeks, teams made up of a grade eight student and members of their family signed up to spend at least an hour completing some aspect of the garden construction. Even though I was only able to watch from a distance, it brought me great joy and hope to see these students participate and bring this project to fruition. This is perhaps the first legacy project completed by a graduating class and I hope it is not the last. Our graduates should be extremely proud of what they accomplished in a year of uncertainty.

To say I was blessed with a class of achievers would be an understatement. Throughout the planning of the project and all we did this year, each of them displayed a determination to learn and persevered when faced with challenges. Moving things to a digital platform allowed me to recognize gifts that may not have emerged otherwise. Creating, editing, and presenting videos to demonstrate their learning became the new norm and several students demonstrated an impressive level of creativity and technical skill. The memories I will cherish most about this group are not of their academic prowess, but the little things like watching all twelve playing 'Bump' together at recess and the offbeat discussions that occurred over lunch. It was fun

to sit quietly at my desk and listen to their interactions. Topics were typically quite random and often from a unique perspective, but resulted in many thoughtprovoking discussions.

And now we celebrate their accomplishments as we send them off on the next phase of their academic journey. The class chose Deuteronomy 31:6 as their graduation verse; "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the Lord your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you". It points them courageously forward, knowing that God is always right there beside them as they head off to new adventures and challenges.
